Modern Vintage during the Contemporary Period

Kidston opened her first shop in London's Holland Park in 1993, selling hand-embroidered tea-towels and brightly renovated furniture. By the end of 2013, she had 136 outlets, including a flagship store on Piccadilly next to Fortnum & Mason and four stores in China. Appearing on BBC Radio 4's *Desert Island Discs* programme, Kidston described her shops as provoking a 'Marmite reaction'. In 2010, she sold a majority stake of the company to private equity investors whilst retaining a minority stake and remaining the company's Creative Director.

Prince George of Cambridge wore one of her outfits, which quickly sold out.

Sir Anthony van Dyck

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Florentine Painting Movement of The Renaissance Period (High Italian Renaissance).

Invented sfumato, changed art forever. This technique blends paint and makes transitions in colour and tone and depth appear seamless. His works had a hyper-real appearance. This had never been done before. It influences painting, photography and cinematography to this day.

He painted the Mona Lisa. This painting is widely considered to be the most famous painting in the world. His paintings include secular and non-secular compositions.



The Antwerp School during the Baroque Period

Van Dyck was the most important Flemish painter of the 17<sup>th</sup> century after Rubens. He was an extremely successful portraitist. He also painted religious and mythological compositions. He was also an accomplished draughtsperson.

He is best known for his portraits of the aristocracy, most notably Charles I. Van Dyck became the dominant influence on English portrait-painting for the next 150 years.






Renaissance Architecture during the Renaissance Period.

Da Vinci

Although we cannot positively attribute any existing building to Leonardo, it is easy to divine from his sketches what his designs may or would have been in stone. They would, firstly, have revealed the sense of harmony that characterised this purist *par excellence*, by the perfect equilibrium of the different parts of the edifice, attached to the central body by an absolutely organic and vital bond. Churches on a concentric plan, that is to say with the lower aisles and chapels grouped as closely as possible round a central cupola which dominates the whole structure.

The English Classical Tradition during the Baroque Period

Jones was an English painter, architect and designer who founded the English Classical Tradition of architecture during the English Renaissance. This was an intellectual movement that sought to mimic the literature, art and philosophy of Antiquity, especially Ancient Rome.

He is also widely credited as the inventor of moveable scenery in theatre. Influences theatre, drama, cinema and televisual conventions to this day.

High-Tech Architecture during the Late-Modern / Post-Modern Period

Sir Norman Robert Foster, Baron Foster of Thames Bank, is an English architect and designer. Closely associated with the development of high-tech architecture, Foster is recognised as a key figure in British modernist architecture. His architectural practice Foster + Partners, first founded in 1967 as Foster Associates, is the largest in the United Kingdom, and maintains offices internationally. He is the President of the Norman Foster Foundation, created to 'promote interdisciplinary thinking and research to help new generations of architects, designers and urbanists to anticipate the future'. The foundation, which opened in June 2017, is based in Madrid and operates globally.

Without the Sainsbury Centre modern largespan building such as supermarkets, would not expose their services as they do today. When you next shop in a supermarket look up and see the cable trays and air conditioning all open to view, then look up the Pompidou Centre and the Lloyds Building in London.

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Renaissance Polymath during the Renaissance Period

Davinci is widely considered a visionary genius. His sketches of his inventions included artillery, complex fortification, helicopters, tanks and much more. These inventions were only realised centuries after his death.

It has been said that if Davinci had had access to a power plant, such an internal combustion engine, world history from his life onwards would have been wholly different.

Mathematician, Computer Scientist and Cryptanalyst during the Abstract Impressionist Period.

Often considered the father of modern computer science. He was famous for his work developing the first modern computers, decoding the encryption of German Enigma machines during WWII. He also detailed a procedure known as the Turing Test, for forming the basis for artificial intelligence.

His image features on the reverse side of the £50 banknote. This is the first time a known gay person has featured on Bank of England banknote.
